Also, as you all know, obedience is not a big money-maker for any club. We will need to do fund-raising to cover the costs of obedience trials until obedience gets back on its feet.

And our UPBA community should be ready to offer Poodle Breeds shows in different regions of the country. Again, joining with another club as we have successfully done with AHTA in North Carolina, should be possible in other areas. Think about the UKC shows in your region, and whether you and a few other members can join them to put on a UPBA breed show.

Thanks to each of you who attended our 0n-line Annual Meeting on September 24th. We had more than 15 members present which was wonderful! Eleni Stevens, our Secretary, has included the draft copy of the minutes of that meeting for all to read. Also, it is necessary for each of you who attended to clip, sign, and mail/fax to Eleni your written vote on the motions made. This is a technical requirement of UKC for On-line meetings.

Correspondence and *Our Reply*

Dear UKC Obedience Club;

First let me introduce myself. My name is Denise Vavla and I have been with the United Kennel Club since 1996. I am initiating this letter to gather information from your club in an effort to improve the UKC Obedience Program.

I have been involved in many facets of the sport of dogs including Obedience trialing, for over 30 years. I personally know the ups and downs of trialing and the commitment it takes to train a dog to the highest level. As the years have gone by, I've seen a disinterest growing in this sport and unfortunately, it's hard to pinpoint the exact cause. Can it be the lack of commitment, time constraints, family constraints or the economy? All I know is that Obedience trials have been on the decline over a number of years.

Obedience training club's can be of great assistance when it comes to recruiting new enthusiasts for this sport. While it is a must to have all dogs receive basic training, most clubs' stop short in providing its students the necessary tools and encouragement to train their dogs at a higher level. If an individual club's instructor or assistants do not provide any encouragement for the student to continue training their dog to a higher level, how can this sport survive?

If we want traditional obedience to survive, it must be up to us to find the cause and to make adjustments. We must be able to encourage those who are training their dogs to take the next step and start trialing. However, in order to do so, we must first identify the possible causes in the drop of entries at obedience trials and then work on the solution.

Here are some of the trend I have seen happening at local clubs.

► Club's are only interest is offering beginner classes to the general public.

► Club's are not experience enough to be able to offer training at a higher level.

► Clubs are not interested in offering higher level training classes since there is no benefit or profit in offering classes to relatively few people interested in higher training.

► Clubs do not have properly trained instructors for higher classes nor the resources to get trained instructors.

► Clubs are using inexperienced instructors (basically this is a student who has a couple of basic obedience classes under their belt) to teach other students how to train dogs.

► There are instructors who have no interest in gaining more experience in training their own dogs and promoting the benefits of higher levels of training.

► There are instructors that have either never trialed a dog or have not gone beyond the CD level.

Does your club agree with the above trends? Can you club identify other areas of concern?

Could this trend be stemming from what is being presented at many "obedience" training classes? I know what I see is very disheartening. Therefore, with this in mind, I am asking that you pose these questions to your club members and then have you submit all possible answers to these questions:

1. How does your club view what is happening to the attendance at Obedience Trials?

I think the economy has much to do with all trials being down. I think obedience has been replaced with Rally by many novices. I believe Agility was the start of the downfall of traditional obedience and then Rally came along which helped it.

This is a bad year all around for the economy, etc. (maybe two or three years).

Non UPBA comment: Locally in ABOCI (San Diego), our club (seemed like it was dying but recently there is a lot more interest in advanced obedience and informal workouts once a week.

The difficulty we have with trials is getting people to work them. The paperwork, getting judges, ribbons, etc., etc, is daunting. For UPBA, this is a problem because we are so widespread - for ABOCI (San Diego), this is a problem because everybody's BUSY and, face it, a lot of club members want to be members but not workers.

I don't think there's no interest. We get a lot of interest in basic and advanced obedience - I see interest but lack of time and resources. I think more PR work is needed to have the general public realize more what is out there - it sure seems like everybody owns a dog these days. Non UPBA comment: One of the all-breed clubs I belong to has totally dropped obedience from their clusters because it does not make money for them and because there are few obedience people willing to put in the hours and work involved. None of the local clubs I belong to (3) support or put on any kinds of training classes – lack of space to teach in and lack of those willing to teach.

Nowadays many people will take their dogs to a six week pet obedience class, and are content with that. If they decide they want to do more with their dog, they go into fun agility classes. The public perception is that agility is much more fun because for the average spectator, it is obvious that the dogs and the handlers are having fun. Contrast this to what is seen at an obedience trial, where the perception is that it is not fun because the handlers aren't jumping around praising the dog, and because the dog is under control during the exercises. Those of us actually involved understand the deep relationship that involves with obedience, but this is not readily apparent to a spectator who does not understand the sport. Lately the economy being so down has a great deal to do with entries. Folks want to have fun but have a limited amount of bucks to do it with, so they go where they can have the most fun cheaply. And with the sheer number of agility trials around that's what gets the bucks. Folks wall show outdoors in agility but only indoors for obedience (I'm guilty of that!)

2. Why is it that people are no longer interested in committing to training their dog for traditional obedience?

The training is fine, the showing isn't fun. I much prefer Rally and wish UKC would offer it. I think given the positive rally training and fun rally provides gives confidence to the dog/ handler team to go on to traditional obedience. Let's face it, a course, where you don't know what it's going to be, or the same old pattern every time; dogs lined up to intimidate one another - which would you choose? I have taken a path as a novice to get my Rally level 2 title and then complete my novice obedience. I think many are going that direction. Without unlimited funds, trials are expensive to go to in my area (at least 150 miles away), so you need to get the most bang for the buck.....I want to title in a weekend and champion in two or three.....not have to keep trying because my dog broke the sit stay at 59.5 seconds because the dog next to him is locking eyes and growling. It's a waste of time and money and I don't know that I want to train my dog to sit next to a maniac for an unspecified period (in the dogs mind, it could be forever)......I'm trying to build trust. Partly because of the cost involved and the time commitment involved in doing and showing in traditional obedience. How many younger people have the time to commit to dog training? I think that the increase in other dog sports has decreased the interest in formal obedience. Many of the people I know in other venues find them more 'fun' for the dog and less stressful for them When I first started, Obedience was pretty much the only game in town—I was already putting titles on my first competition dog when I discovered agility. Agility was fun and easy (sort of) and required very little actual training other than teaching the dog how to do the obstacles. Courses in those days were pretty straight forward, and you really did not need "handling" skills. Today's Novice course is what I ran in Excellent all those years ago—much harder now! Most folks are daunted by the formality of competition obedience and look at some of the teams that are out there and feel intimidated. It takes a while for the newbies to see obedience as the beautifully choreographed dance that is really is. Rally is a great deal of funand most rally moves are how obedience was taught years agodoodling. Came way before attention classes. And it worked to teach

dogs to heel.

3. What is it going to take to get people interested in trialing their dogs?

I think the interest is already there, it just has to be made to be more fun for the team; introduction of more positive methods and techniques that lend themselves to a wider variety of breeds and temperaments. As above - I think more PR. More general information about what's available and how fun it is.

Good publicity that highlights what an obedience-trained dog can contribute to a person's lifestyle. Obedience training needs to be presented in a more practical viewpoint (I don't mean in the family obedience sense) but more from the point of view of what it will accomplish for the average person who has to take their dog to the vet's, and the vet has trouble getting the dog to be still for an examination.

4. As a UKC Obedience Club, what are you doing to help traditional Obedience to grow before it becomes extinct?

This is a tough one, as we (UPBA) don't give classes - we hold shows. I'm not sure, other than promotion of the sport through our newsletter.

We are trying to continue to hold trials, even if they are not money makers, and publicize them, to drum up interest. Everyone who comes and has a good time is a walking advertisement for the next show.

Non UPBA comment: Only one of the clubs in Maryland provides classes – so for the most part, the best that is happening is that the clubs are at least including obedience on their calendars

5. How can we express to the clubs that instructors and assistants need to have enthusiasm for this sport so that we can get the students interested in continuing in their training?

Again, more featured articles by positive people showing it's fun, not stuffy, boring, repetitive.

Non UPBA comment: In our club in San Diego, where we have classes, we need to do basic obedience to keep our place at the city Rec Center. There 's more student interest in basic obedience and more instructor interest in advanced classes and training for particular obedience activities. We have raised the amount we pay instructors in the last year and that seems to be helping.

We have very good instructors who are doing advanced work with their dogs - they just hate teaching the basic classes and don't really have time for it.

I don't think it's a fault of either the instructors or assistants. I feel that new comers to obedience are daunted by formal obedience competition. A primer of ...say.... Rally can make a difference.

6. Does your club have a step up training program that goes beyond the beginning level and if so, what is it?

I think UPBA is too far flung to even consider obedience training as a "club" activity. We must continue to hold obedience trials, hopefully across the country in the areas where we have enough club members to put on a well-run trial. Non UPBA comment: ABOCI (San Diego) does not have a formal step up program.

Non UPBA comment: My particular club (Staten Island, NY) offers more competition classes than any other level of class. Every week we hold 2 utility classes, 2 open classes, 2 novice classes, 1 teaching open, and 1 attention and handling (8 classes total). We also offer 4-5 pet classes/week and on a rotating basis, rally, conformation, therapy dog, etc-whatever the greatest call is. We have many club members that have earned high titles on their dogs in AKC, UKC and ASCA. In order to assist at a pet level class, one must obtain at least a CD. We have a paid, professional trainer who also shows her own dogs in performance as the competition classes instructor. She has multiple OTCH titles. I'm currently the UKC "guru" at our club as I am the only club member at this time with a UOCH (We had 2 others but they moved away). Out of 94 members, most show on a routine basis, but, like other clubs, most now show in agility. We do have a hard core of about 25 members that show in more than one dog sport, several of us show in 3 or more dog sports. Most are conformation, obedience, agility and rally, with others showing in flyball, herding and earthdog events as well.

a. Is it working? b. Why or why not?

Additional comments from UPBA members:

I can not respond from a formal obedience perspective, since I have never competed in formal obedience. However, I can tell you why I didn't compete. My experience with formal obedience was based on AKC rules/ regs and attitude. I think those prevail in peoples minds when they think 'Obedience.' I trained my first dog through Open but compared to agility I found it too stuffy, rigid and stressful, so I never competed. I have since discovered Rally and feel that there is a large percentage of people who, having given up on obed, are going on to Rally. I know this doesn't answer your question but indirectly here is how it relates: Now that I have competed in Rally and gotten some experience under my belt I feel more confident that I could compete in formal obedience and plan to move in that direction. I know two people who finished their Rally titles and are now 'Turned ON' to obedience and pursuing their CD titles. I think it would be very beneficial for UKC to get Rally UP and Running!



Standards featured in *NYS Conservationist* as Unusual Gundogs

My Standard, Jackson, was featured in the lead article of the New York State Conservationist magazine in October, 2008. The feature, "New York hunters discover some unusual gundog breeds" by Elaine Bloom and Colleen Kimble, led off with a description of Jackson and his drive for retrieving ducks. I related some of our experiences in hunt tests, and described the outstanding abilities of Standard Poodles for marking, style, perseverance, and of course their trainability. These are all required skills for a good hunting dog, and for hunt test titles. The article included two beautiful full-page photos of Standards (neither of which was Jackson). The authors followed my lead in encouraging people to consider a poodle for hunting, but cautioned them that poodles are different than Labs and Goldens, and require a different training style. I was careful to advise looking for reputable breeders who can help identifying a pup who demonstrates natural hunting instincts.

Other waterfowl hunting dogs featured in this article were the American Water Spaniel, Irish Red & White Setter, Nova Scotia Duck Tolling Retriever, and the Spinoni Italiano. All of the owners of these dogs stressed, as I did, that these intelligent and talented retrievers must be trained without a lot of pressure, with training sessions kept fun, upbeat, and challenging.

Jackson is a multi-talented Standard, being an avid listener as a R.E.A.D. ®partner in an after-school program for disadvantaged middle-schoolers, but he loves nothing more than when the hunt training gear comes out! Sally Eller

How to be a Good (& effective) Leader Mary Woodward Greenwood Dog Training School, Wilmington, DE

Although there is some discussion about whether dogs truly consider people as part of their "pack," I think everyone agrees that they do recognize - and respect leadership.

Every group has a leader, and if the dog in the family senses that none of the humans is taking that role, they will likely rise to fill it. Along with the responsibilities of leadership comes that of discipline. And no human wants to be disciplined by a dog!

Being a good leader for your pet does not mean being rough. It does, however, mean being strong and confident; sure in what you do. Some people seem to act this way naturally, others need a little help. Below I've listed some of the things you can do which will help your dog recognize you as a leader. Your entire family should be familiar with these rules and apply them consistently - especially children!

* Please note! If aggression is already a concern, then proceed very carefully! Best advice in that case is to get the help of an animal behaviorist who can work privately with you. Call your vet, local obedience schools, or animal shelters for recommendations. Be sure to hire someone who uses positive reinforcement methods!

Give your dog plenty of attention, exercise, play, and grooming!

So many behavioral problems are due to insufficient exercise and pure boredom. Dogs are social animals and they need exercise (some breeds more than others). If your dog is driving you crazy, try getting up 1/2 hr earlier every day and taking him for a walk or run. Don't take young dogs for long walks as you need to wait for their growth plates to close - ask your vet for when this will be for your breed. But once they are ready, definitely walk with your dog at least 60 minutes EACH DAY. This can be broken up into smaller walks (i.e. 30 mins in the morning, 30 in the evening). Do this even if your dog has lots of playtime in the yard - walking with you is very relationship-building as well as exercising. You might be amazed at the change in him! Work hard on that Loose-Leash Walking lesson to make this as fun for you as it is for him. Most breeds were bred to perform a duty and if not given a "job" to do, will invent their own...

Feed your dog!

Providing the food is an important leadership role, so make it clear that you are doing so. Instead of leaving a bowlful of food out all day, have mealtimes where your dog can eagerly await you placing his bowl - filled with high quality food - down for him. As soon as your dog has some basic training, have him give eye contact or do a quick stay before he gets the bowl.

Have the right of way

Is your dog in your way or where you want to be? Move him. Give him a nudge & say "move." If that provokes growling or snarling, then please contact a behaviorist. Unless there is a history of abuse, then your dog probably already thinks HE is the leader, and that you are out of line telling him to move. Since you don't want to be bitten, get professional help, please! A young, healthy dog should move out of your way. When he gets old & arthritic, then you can start stepping over or around him.

Greet the human members of your family first

When you come home, greet any other members of your family before giving any attention to your dog. This may be difficult, as your family members probably aren't bounding up to the door to say hello! However, do your best to walk past your dog and to hug or kiss your family members before turning to crouch & calmly greet your dog.

Play games & keep the toys when you are done Initiate fun games with your dog, such as retrieving games, tug o' war, and hide & seek. Have special toys for these games that you get from a closet or drawer, and when the game is over be sure to put the toys back away. In a sense, these toys are special "kills" for your dog, and the pack leader should have control over them.

Eat before you feed your dog

The top pack members get first choice at the food, but since you probably aren't interested in your dog's dinner, just be sure to eat your own first! If you're not ready yet, then just have a cracker or a drink of water... and be sure your dog is watching.

Be sure your dog earns your attention

Every meal, play session, petting session, etc., should start with your dog responding to you, not the other way around. This needn't be complicated, just have your dog sit or respond to his name (the Attention work!) before you do something for him. Or call him to come to you for the fun!

Go through narrow openings first

In other words, don't let your dog blow past you through the door or up or down the stairs! This is as much a safety issue as it is a leadership one. Teach him the Wait or Stay command. Until then, just take hold of his collar and hold him in place while you walk through the door. That's a bit trickier with the stairs, so work hard on those commands! Once your dog is reliable with those commands, then you can certainly choose to let him go ahead first if that is more convenient for you. But he should wait for your permission to proceed.

Ignore your dog if you are busy

Of course, this is only feasible if you give him plenty of attention & exercise otherwise. But don't feel that you are at your dog's beck & call! Hardly dignified behavior for a leader...

Put your dog in "Time Out" if he is getting out of control

If playtime with you is getting too rowdy, or playing with another dog is starting to get nasty, then quietly put your dog in "Time Out." That can be his crate (as long as he is already comfortable with it), or simply in another room for a few minutes. If you are consistent with this, he will soon learn to control his behavior so the fun can continue! Do realize that dogs can sound pretty awful when playing with each other. They can bark, growl, have their hackles up, nip at each other - all is usually fine as long as they are bouncy. If they start to get stiff or if blood is being drawn, of course, it's time to end it.

Realize that your dog is a dog

Remember that everything dogs do that we dislike - biting, barking, jumping up, eliminating inside, chewing, etc. - is totally normal dog behavior! If we want our dogs to stop doing these things, then it is completely our responsibility to train him not to. No fair expecting him to "know better" or to learn to stop doing something so natural and fun just because he was caught & punished a few times. Often dogs can simply learn that they can't do those things in the presence of a human. Instead, make sure your dog gets plenty of exercise and has appropriate things to chew (real meaty bones from the butcher, Kongs or bones stuffed with treats are great!) If a problem behavior continues, then realize that the fault lies in your training and management (or lack thereof). So take the time to think about the behavior and think about what you can do the change things. Don't expect your dog to act like Lassie, because "Lassie" really never existed. She was just a well trained Collie, with a smart trainer who was always just out of camera range.

Reinforce what you like

Be sure to clearly communicate to your dog what behaviors you DO like! Someone walked by the window and he didn't bark at them? "What a good boy!" A reinforcement can be a treat, praise, an ear rub, a ball thrown... whatever your dog loves. If being "naughty" is the only way your dog gets you to pay attention to him, then expect him to be naughty a lot.

Ignore what you don't like (or make it stop "working" for the dog)

Unless the behavior is dangerous or really destructive, ignore behaviors you don't like. And realize that any attention from you is reinforcing! Yelling, hitting, shoving all are forms of attention, which your dog naturally craves. A far more effective teaching method is to ignore the undesirable behavior. If it's something that the dog has been doing for a long time, earning your attention every time, then you can pretty much expect it to get worse before it stops. Whatever he was doing worked before, so he may try harder & harder to get it to work again. Stand your ground! Eventually he'll give up, having learned it doesn't work anymore. The behavior will be extinguished. (Be careful - if you ignore something for a while, then give in, you'll have taught him that he needs to be really annoying to get your attention!) And in many situations, you can think about what you would rather your dog be doing. Instead of begging at the table, how able reinforcing a down stay during your meal?

Of course, some behaviors are reinforced without your attention. "Counter surfing," barking at the neighbors, getting in the trash, chasing cars, etc... So do your best to manage the environment so that those behaviors either become impossible for the dog (put the trash in a closet, don't let him run loose to chase cars), or stop working for the dog (if trips to the counter yield no food, he'll stop bothering to do so).

Train desirable behaviors

Which is what the rest of this web site is about! If you haven't already, please go to the lessons & start learning how.

Great trainers have great dogs!

How NOT to Celebrate Your Wedding Anniversary: Hip Luxation By Rina Phillips

July 24th, 2008. My 27th wedding anniversary. "Oh NO!!!! Taj!! Oh NO!!! NO!!!! He ran over my Dog! Oh NO!!

I ran out to him. He bit at me. He is yelping and biting at his butt. The vet; where is his number? I run into the house. Taj is up on the porch crying. I call the vet. Telling him I am 20 minutes away and what happened. I don't know how it happened or what happened exactly. But he is hurt.

OK OK Get a grip. Put him on a blanket and get him to the truck. Front seat.

Taj is calm now and I see in his eyes: "what happened to me, what is going on?" Oh poor baby. We are going to fix you up. I promise. We will keep doing rally, obedience, camping, and road trips, all of it. I promise. It was one of the longest 20 minutes of my life. Oh great, Tom (the vet) is in the driveway waiting for us. We lift Taj out of the truck and onto the ground, Tom exams Taj right there. He thinks it may be pelvis or dislocated hip. His x-ray machine is not set up yet. I didn't know that. So we load Taj back in the truck after a couple of shots for pain and off to a vet who has an x-ray machine. Tom calls the vet to tell them I am on my way. I am sooo sorry Taj. He just looks so confused. What IS going on! I am sure that is what he is thinking. I hope he does not blame me too much for being so careless. Drive, be calm, get through this. It will be okay. So, next vet. Someone help me get Taj out of the truck. Where is the vet? I need him NOW!!! Lets go. I swear everyone had lead in their pants for a bit. They tell me to leave the room. Are they nuts? OK Ok you have to do your jobs. I get it. Vet comes out and tells me he thinks dislocation. X-rays show dislocation. At least it is not broke, we can fix this Right? He will be fine Right? OK so put him under, put the hip back in place, stays overnight in a sling, I pick him up tomorrow. Rest and he will be good as new. Unless the hip does not stay in place. What, go home and see yah tomorrow? Are they kidding? What do you mean I can't stay here? I can't go home yet. I run to my best poodle, camping, hang out with buddy and we have a good cry.

After a sleepless night, needless to say, I get to the vet and the receptionist looks at me solemnly. "The Doc would like to talk to you." Oh NO!! The hip did not stay in place. Surgery is needed. Where, who, when, will the surgery happen? This vet may be good but don't I want the best and someone who does this type of surgery daily? You bet I do. Taj is resting and waiting for a decision. I of course go to my buddy and her roomy, who also is a poodle buddy, and sicker than a dog himself. Thanks so much for your support. I don't know how I would have gotten through this with out it.

We talk, we call our vet, talk some more, and while I am on the phone with Tom, (the first vet), my buddy is calling the University and telling them we will arrive about 8pm. Will they be ready for us? Yes they will.

We arrive 7:30pm. They take him away to ICU. Fill out paper work. Check Taj in. They will give him drugs, CBC, Chemistry, and keep him quiet. We had the X-rays from home but they took more. See you tomorrow. Here is our number. Call and check on Taj when you want. The Doctor will look at Taj and x-rays tomorrow and decide what to do. Find a motel, can't sleep, call the number every 2 hours, it seemed. Yes. Open reduction was performed using a toggle method. This is when an anchor is placed in the socket of the hip joint (acetabulum) and connected to a heavy nylon suture. The suture is then threaded through a drilled hole in the head and neck of the femur (thigh bone) and anchored on the other side. The suture is tightened to ensure the hip stays in joint. Taj's joint capsule was also torn which they repaired and tightened to help ensure the hip remained in joint. Are you kidding??

We can pick him up the next day. It went well except a toggle broke and is wondering around in the muscle, which they think is no problem. Hope they are right. Motel, no sleep, well hardly any, calling every time we think about it, the place is on speed dial now. OK we can bring him home. Thanks again for coming with me, poodle, camping, hang out with buddy, best friend. We are home.



A walk-about is used to take Taj to the bathroom. On a leash for 8 weeks. No jumping, you tell a poodle not to jump, play, run, and slide around corners. Walk only and then back to a kennel. That was the hardest; keeping him on all fours after he started to feel better. And he did start to feel better. But tender. Rehabilitation. Stitches

out. Still kennel when not around. Always on a leash. No running in the house or anywhere for that matter.

Rehab center prescribes exercises: leash work, hills, caveletties, stepovers,

spirals, serpentines, then stairs, small jumps, tunnels. Finally supervised off leash activity. Incorporate rally exercises into routine. Yeah Hah!!!

We are on the mend and working towards a Rally trial in January. In the mean time we are enjoying the fall. Running, playing, jumping some, and having a great time.
