2006 UPBA Fall Specialty Update By Chairperson Beth Quinn

Our fall show event in Maryland is really shaping up!! We have a number of talented UPBA members who have volunteered, pitched in, organized, planned, ordered, and prepared everything needed to pull off a really wonderful show for our exhibitors. This show is truly a team effort. The ribbons have been ordered and will be delivered in a couple of weeks. The prizes for the classes have been arriving, donated by generous UPBA members and corporate sponsors, and it's been like Christmas around here. The prizes are just fantastic! The Old State Line Dog Training Club has been terrific to work with and our entire event weekend promises to be one you won't want to miss! New for our show this year, will be several nonlicensed classes we haven't offered before, including a non-licensed (non-pointed) Special Exhibition class – the Parade of Honors. This class is a "brag" class for dogs who have already won a UKC title or titles. Entries must hold a UKC title – no exceptions. The handler of each dog is asked to submit with their entry, a short (150 words or less, typed if possible) resume giving the dog's accomplishments, which will be read as the handler moves the dog around the ring. This class is perfect for the stud dog, brood bitch or retired veteran – any dog with honors an owner is proud of. Every dog entered will have his/her moment in the limelight!!

Also new for this year will be our very own catalog of pre-entered exhibitors. There will be spaces provided to write in day-of-show entries, so you can have a complete record of which dogs competed. The catalog is also open to advertising - \$20 whole page, \$10 half-page and \$5 quarterpage. This would be an ideal spot to place that stud or new litter ad, or advertise your wares and expert services. Catalogs will be available on the day of show at the UPBA show secretary's table.

There are several motels in the area which allow dogs. These include:

There are other motels also. I have not stayed in any of them so cannot make any recommendations, other than to mention that the

Old Line State club is using the Best Western as their primary motel. You may be able to get a better rate than those above. The above info was taken from American Automobile Association materials. Camping on the show grounds is available and is nearby the conformation and obedience rings. The cost is \$30 for the entire weekend (Friday evening through Sunday afternoon). There is electric hook-up, but no water hook-up. You pay Old Line State Dog Training Club at check in on the day of arrival and a parking pass is issued at that time – no prepayment. There is 24 hour access in and off the grounds – no locked gate.

According to our club By-Laws, we must hold our annual meeting in conjunction with our show. To accommodate our members who wish to show on Sunday, our annual meeting will be held immediately after the completion of our specialty on Saturday evening. The meeting will be short and sweet this year, since we will not be electing new officers. Tentative plans are to hold the meeting beside the obedience ring in the 4-H building, which is near the conformation rings. Please bring your lawn chairs and plan to attend this important meeting!

Also in the works is a UKC Family Obedience demonstration. Details have not been finalized at the time of this writing, but we are hopeful we will be able to host this event on Saturday, during the day before our specialty. Check the UPBA member's e- list for further updates.

Why Not Try Hunt Testing Your Poodle? By Gary Scovel

Does your Standard Poodle like to (1) chase squirrels, birds, butterflies, deer, scratch deer, that's a no-no (2) retrieve (3) swim? If you said no to #1 I doubt your poodle has ever been allowed the freedom it deserves to let long hidden talents surface, in order to grow hair for the show ring. If you answered yes to #1 only you have a very normal standard poodle. Maybe its time you should consider training for and entering an HRC-UKC hunt test. Two and three can be easily taught.

Do not stop reading. You do not need to be a hunter to enjoy this unique sport. There are tons of things to enjoy doing with your poodle(s). However, unless you have given it/them the opportunity to do what they were originally bred for you will never realize the fun, excitement and thrill of accepting a hunt test ribbon after passing. And, your poodle will love you even more for giving it the chance to truly enjoy life. Seeing a poodle, its tail frantically signaling it has a nose full of bird scent, followed with a cat like pounce on its prey is a sight to behold. Hunt tests are noncompetitive, pass or fail only. There is no hidden agenda by anyone entered to win at all cost. Strong support to each person and dog being tested, regardless of breed, from everyone entered permeates the air. Advice from pro handlers to amateurs is freely given.

The HRC (Hunting Retriever Club) is affiliated with the United Kennel Club, Inc. UKC holds the registry for HRC and offers 5 hunt test titles to the HRC program: Started Hunting Retriever (SHR); Hunting Retriever (HR); Hunting Retriever Champion (HRCH); Grand Hunting Retriever Champion (GRHRCH) and Upland Hunter (UH). There are currently 4 HRCH poodles. The most recent was entered in the June Spring Grand, the super bowl of the HRC testing program. Unfortunately it did not pass but then only 99 dogs of over 300 entered did.

These titles once earned are added as a prefix to the dog's pedigree. The more common terms to describe levels are, Started, Seasoned, and Finished. Your pure bred poodle does not need to be UKC registered to enter an HRC test. When a test is passed the owner has 60 days to register the dog with UKC to keep the pass with points earned part of it's permanent record toward the appropriate title.

What do you need to do to get ready for an HRC test? All scheduled tests dates

and locations are listed on the HRC-UKC web site >www.hrc-ukc.com< under calendar of events, fourth one down in left column on the home page. Find one you can attend, watch and ask questions. Visit all three levels, Started, Seasoned, and Finished. There are HRC tests in 21 states and 1 in Canada this Sept. alone, more in Oct. and plenty next spring. Do not let it bother you there might be no other poodles entered. Think about being the first.

Ok, you've watched and decided Started is for you. You will need to wear a camo hat, shirt, and pants but can probably slide by with a non-camo dark pair of pants. My wife has an entire new wardrobe of camo clothing and has never hunted a day in her life. You will also need a loud whistle and duck call.

You've learned you will not have to shoot a shotgun in Started. Some one else can do it for you. Once you have titled with 4 passes in Started you and your poodle will be hooked on HRC-UKC hunt testing. Especially after the traditional water soaking for that hard earned title. Shooting a shotgun using blanks is required at the next two levels. It's really very simple. Although not mandatory attending a Hunter Education class sponsored by your states Dept. of Natural Resources is a good way to learn gun safety, strongly stressed by HRC.

When you and your poodle are called to the line from the holding blind you will probably be asked to sit on a bucket. When you're ready you blow the duck call. This signals a person usually about 40-60 yards away hiding behind a blind or bush to throw a dead duck. When this happens a gunner standing to the side will fire one shot. You can restrain your poodle by its collar in Started but be ready to let go lest you get yanked off the bucket on your face. This is good. It means you have a really driven poodle and it should go far with hunt testing. However, you cannot let go until the duck hits the ground so hang on until it does.

I deally, your poodle should go directly to the duck, that's called "marking," pick it up immediately and return directly to you. I t does not have to deliver to hand in Started but a nice snappy heel and sit holding the duck does impress the judges. Another single retrieve immediately follows; smile, thank the judges, leash your dog and run for the john, you may need to.



Scout at the recent HRC-UKC Finished test in MN: First was a land triple (1,2,3) then a blind retrieve where dog is handled to a bird it has not seen fall, then a diversion bird is thrown. This bird falls close to the dog as it returns the blind. It has to deliver the blind before it picks up the diversion bird. In other words it cannot drop the blind bird and switch to the diversion bird. This is followed by honoring the next dog without disturbing it or breaking it's stay while the working dog makes its first retrieve. You are then excused from the line but still under judgment until behind the judges where you can leash your dog. The water series followed the land. Here's Scout going out for last bird down (the go bird) of the land triple. Normally the above scenario is repeated on water after all the dogs have completed the land. Some judges use various combinations, water, land, water, land, etc. but Started will always consist of two single marks on land and two in water. Even though you know your dog has failed the first series, be it land or water, you still get to continue the next series. This is unique to HRC.

Don't waste the entry fee for Started until your poodle willing enters immediate swimming depth water, reliably picks up, holds, carries and retrieves immediately to you a dead duck without damaging it. An excellent way to jack up your poodles prey/retrieve drive is to start it young with live wing clipped birds, i.e. pigeons, quail, chukar, etc. eventually graduating to ducks. It should also have completed force fetch training. If you are not familiar with or not comfortable with FF pay a professional.

If you've ever doubted poodles love to hunt, retrieve, can be successful with passing advanced hunt test levels, and still be the perfect pet visit my web site at <u>www.Lakelandhuntingpoodles.com</u> to see proof.



Study Finds That a Type of Cancer in Dogs Is Contagious Submitted by Julie Borst Reed

Researchers Say Data on Canine Sticker's Sarcoma Illustrate the Resourcefulness of DNA By Rick Weiss Washington Post Staff Writer Friday, August 11, 2006; Page A03

Scientists in England have gathered definitive evidence that a kind of Cancer in dogs is contagious -- a peculiar exception to the age-old medical wisdom that you can't "catch" cancer.

Although no human cancer is known to spread naturally from person to person, the finding of such a disease in dogs -and emerging evidence that a different contagious cancer is spreading among marsupials in Tasmania -- is a reminder, scientists said, that under the rules of evolution, DNA will try anything to perpetuate itself. A cancer cell is usually an animal's or person's own cell that -- because of exposure to a virus or other environmental agent -- has broken free of normal growth controls. Cancer-causing viruses may spread from person to person, but the cancer does not.

But the dog cancer, known as Sticker's sarcoma, is spread by tumor cells getting passed from dog to dog through sex or from animals biting or licking each other.

WET SPRING MEANS MORE OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEPTOSPIROSIS

It's spring, so that means flowers blooming from the spring rains and more opportunities for leptospirosis to spread to domestic and wild animals.

"Lepto is everywhere," said Dr. Kenneth Harkin, a Kansas State University veterinarian and infectious disease specialist whose research emphasis is on Leptospirosis. Harkin said lepto is more prevalent during the spring months rather than winter because of weather conditions. "Lepto loves wet soil," Harkin said. "It's just too cold in the winter."

Leptospirosis is a bacterial disease that affects humans and animal, but according to Harkin, is rarely seen in cats. The bacteria are spread through the urine of infected animals, which can get into water or soil and can survive there for weeks to months. Infected wild and domestic animals may continue to excrete the bacteria into the environment continuously or every once in a while for a few months up to several years, according to the Centers for Disease Control. Leptospira varieties have what are termed maintenance hosts and incidental hosts. Maintenance hosts are those animal species which serve as a reservoir for the Leptospira organism, and in which transmission is very efficient. Incidental hosts include those species of animals that do not act as reservoirs, but that can be

infected by the organism. The organism replicates in the kidneys of maintenance hosts and is shed in the urine. Transmission can occur to the new host, either maintenance or incidental, by coming in contact with contaminated water, soil or the carcass of an infected animal.

The disease is caused by Leptospirosis spp., a spirochete bacteria related to the bacteria that causes Lyme disease and syphilis. There are more than 300 pathogenic varieties (serovars), worldwide. Historically, in the United States, two varieties -- canicola and icterohaemorrhagiae -were primarily responsible for the disease in dogs. The incidence of infection from these two has declined over the past 30 years, most likely due in large measure to vaccination. The increase in cases most recently has been due primarily to the varieties pomona and grippotyphosa. Until recently no vaccine for these varieties was available.

Because of increased building and development into areas that were previously rural, pets may be exposed to more wildlife, such as raccoons, skunks, squirrels, opossums, or deer that are infected with leptospirosis.

"While people may think of Lepto as a disease spread by wildlife, it can come from backyard wildlife, including raccoons -- even city dogs can get lepto," Harkin said.

Humans are also at risk for contracting leptospirosis. Symptoms can be relatively mild and include flu-like symptoms, ocular pain, redness of the eyes, nasal discharge, fever, or muscle and joint pain; however, it can progress to more severe kidney and liver failure.

"Leptospirosis is a zoonotic disease, Harkin said. "You can get it from your pet. The bacteria can enter the body through skin or eyes, nose, or mouth, especially if the skin is broken from a cut or scratch. Drinking contaminated water can also cause infection." Harkin likens contracting the disease to being "hit by a truck."

Leptospirosis can cause an array of clinical signs. The severity of the disease can vary widely; however, leptospirosis has the potential to be severe and even fatal. Symptoms of Leptospiroris are elevated body temperature, vomiting, muscular stiffness, weakness, and inflammation of the kidney. In severe cases, jaundice and death may occur. Central nervous system signs may occur with or without other clinical signs, and organisms may be present in the brain tissue for extended periods. Chronic leptospirosis is primarily associated with chronic kidney degeneration. Shedding of leptospires in the urine may continue for over a year.

Sometimes pets do not have any symptoms. Common clinical signs reported in dogs include fever, vomiting, abdominal pain, diarrhea, refusal to eat, severe weakness and depression, stiffness, severe muscle pain, or inability to have puppies. Generally younger animals are more seriously affected than older animals. Harkin said the vast majority of dogs have a sudden onset of vomiting, which may be proceeded by muscle or joint pain or stiffness. Pet owners may mistake this early stage as arthritis and treat the dog with aspirin or another nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drug. A less frequent symptom seen in dogs is excessive thirst and urination. Harkin said pet owners are at risk because the dog drinks and urinates so much that they may do so in the house, exposing the owner to the disease.

If caught early, Harkin said treatment is usually effective and the survival rate is good. However, time is of the essence.

"If you let it go for three or five days, treat it with the wrong antibiotic or with inappropriate fluid therapy, it can create irreversible renal failure," Harkin said.




Santa, and a magician. Simplicity #4000 has a biker, Little Miss

DNA Testing for von Willebrand's Disease By Elizabeth Glew

Approximately 1% of poodles are affected by von Willebrand's Disease and approximately 9% are carriers. This means that for about 10% of our dogs, vWD needs to be an important factor in breeding decisions. If 10% doesn't sound like a very significant number to you, consider that your chances of winning the lottery are much less than one tenth of 1%, but many of us buy tickets regularly. The chance of a US home being burglarized in any given year is about 10% and we all carry insurance to protect us from such losses. 10% is a significant risk -- far too high to ignore when the health of our beloved poodles and the future of our breeds is at stake.

Fortunately, a reliable test for vWD is now available. Unlike the old Elisa assays which produced variable results and had to be repeated frequently, the DNA test we have now provides one definitive result.

This once-in-a-lifetime test allows owners to know conclusively each dog's vWD status and make breeding (or healthcare) decisions accordingly. Because we can finally be sure exactly what each dog's status is, we can make much better breeding decisions. Previously, many breeders opted not to test for vWD because the results were not entirely reliable and only gave a snapshot of the dog's status at the time of testing. Those worries are now a thing of the past. Because the new test is based on DNA, it is completely reliable and the results will never change.

The DNA test categorizes each dog as clear (no genes for vWD), carrier (some genes for vWD but not enough to produce the disease), or affected (has the genes for vWD and will have the disease). This is a great step forward for the health of our breeds. Knowing each dog's exact vWD status allows breeders to use their best dogs without fear of transmitting this dangerous disease. A carrier can be used in a breeding program, as long as he or she is only bred to clear dogs. Theoretically, even an affected dog could be used if bred to a clear individual since only carriers would be produced. This gives breeders much more freedom in choosing pairings and provides much greater security than the old system.

With this technology readily available, there is no reason, indeed there is no excuse, for any poodle

breeder not to ensure that no puppies s/he produces will be affected by vWD. UPBA's upcoming clinic can even help bring down the cost, and we will be delighted to publicize all your testing brags here in the newsletter.
