We currently have 66 members in 24 states / provinces. Our members own more than 325 poodles. 18 members own more than one size of

poodle, with 2 members owning all three sizes. Standards are the most popular, gracing the homes of 46 members. 18 members have minis and an elite dozen of our members are owned by toys. Six amazing UPBA members with incredible willpower have somehow managed to have just one poodle! The rest of us have between 2 and 41 each. The average number of poodles per member is 4.9.

South Carolina continues to lead in membership with 8, closely followed by Maryland and New Jersey with 6 each. North Carolina boasts 5 UPBA members. Our midwestern membership has grown a bit recently and we now have 11 members scattered throughout this region. In the west, we are represented by 8 widely spread-out poodle-lovers. Please encourage your poodley friends and acquaintances to join UPBA! If we reach "critical mass" in more areas, we will be able to have shows in other parts of the country. Earlier this year, we had the possibility of holding a show in Texas, but had to pass it up because, with only 3 members in the southwest region, we just didn't have the people-power to pull it off. 



As most poodle people, I have not trained in the hunt field. I found, however, that the hunting people in my area are welcoming and in fact admiring of Benson's abilities. As long as I am serious and take constructive criticism ---all dogs are welcome.



That does not mean that I train the same way that they do. They show me the end desired result of a schooling session and I do it my way. So far, they understand that poodles are soft like spaniels and may take a different line of training to end up with the same desired result. Natural Poodle Protection Instincts By Lynnette Janes

Teddy Bear's introduction to the grand-kids was when he was 4 months old, right after we got him. It was impossible to tell if Teddy was lovin' them more or they were lovin' him more. The bonding was immediate. There was this sturdy, irresistible little bundle of joy, with his soft, loose curls, climbing all over them and licking each one from head to toe; and they were squealing and enjoying his wild antics. The grand-kids total three - there are the two rowdy boys, Philip and Ben, then 4 and 3, and one girly-girl baby Poppy at 1. Their visits to grandma & grandpa's house are eagerly anticipated and thoroughly enjoyed.

One afternoon, about a year or more after Teddy's arrival, all three g-kids came for a play day. As the sun came out, the 3 kids and I went outside on the brick patio in our backyard with a blanket and some books and toys. We have about 3/4 acre which is fenced with a tall cyclone fence, and mature fir trees and 30-foot arborvitae all around the fence. The grounds are mostly lawn - which is a neat racing arena/running pad for a growing, streaking, paw-pounding, ears flying, fastest Poodle Teddy. Our home is secluded, set back with a long driveway and not viewable from the street.

Teddy Bear was romping around in the grass, keeping on eye on all of us. At that time, I didn't know how much "eye" he actually was keeping on his family. I was concentrating on the kids. The first inkling of a problem was when I heard the cyclone fence gate being "rattled". I assumed Teddy must have jumped against it while on yet another desperate, unsuccessful squirrel chase. I never investigated the noise.

Some people describe a feeling of being watched that I can now relate to, because I felt a sense of someone else in the back yard. I looked up from the patio and saw a stranger, a man holding a screwdriver in one hand, and walking fast over towards us, with no expression on his face. I yelled at the boys to "get inside" and I was leaning over to scoop up the baby when I saw a blur coming in fast from the other side of the yard.

The blur was Teddy, charging at top speed, totally focused on the stranger, legs flying, head low, picking up even more speed. The boys said he was "bad growling". I was busy with the baby and the back door and the next thing I saw was Teddy throwing himself onto the man, his mouth wide, and biting down towards the man's groin and thigh area.

The man screamed and tried to run the opposite direction. Teddy was not letting go. It was some clumsy, awkward dance of man and dog, with the man back-stepping and twisting, and the dog determined to force him away from us. The man clamored onto the fencing, rolling his body over the top bar, and dropping to the other side. Then Teddy was barking madly, throwing his own body against the fence. We could hear him barking like a dog possessed with fury and rage, jumping high and clanging against the fence, over and over.

I had the kids inside and house and I grabbed the phone to call 9-1-1. I forgot the number. I just looked at the phone like I was frozen. I could hear Teddy's repeated barks, from the bottom of his very deep chest. He was furious and intent.

I was totally shocked, and I remember Philip calling out to me, 'Grandma, that man didn't even say HI..." I tried to call my husband, but I forgot his cell number. I remember thinking that Teddy may somehow follow the man over the fence and chase him out into the street. I needed to get to Teddy. I could hear him barking and barking, a new and cruel bark I had never heard from him before. I peered around the corner of the house and only saw Teddy, jumping against

the fence. I called Teddy and he reluctantly came to me, trotting over with his usual happy face. I hurried him in the house. The kids immediately surrounded him, with hugs. Teddy rolled over, tongue hanging relaxed out the side of his mouth, while Poppy tickled his nose.



This is what I have told the breeder: He went from wild to mild in the blink of an eye. Amazing. I thought he'd be foaming at the mouth, shaking, growly, angry...some type of reaction to the encounter! - and instead he was "off duty", happy to be the center of attention again with lots of cuddles.

Then, within a minute of two, Teddy stood up and ran to the front door, with his deep barking reactivated. We all ran to the front of the house to see my husband's truck coming down the driveway. My husband is an ex-State Police Officer and as soon as he heard a quick replay of events, he ran around the yard looking for the stranger. Teddy was by his side, acting like he was on a mission, acting like this had happened before, something they had practiced, instead of never-in-out-wildest dreams, sniffing the air, sniffing the ground, keeping step by step with my husband. However, there was no sign of the stranger, he was long gone.

My husband told me the gate rattling is a trick burglars use to see if a "dog" responds. Teddy Bear was on the opposite side of the yard and if he even heard that rattling, he probably thought it was just us playing around. I'm happy to report that it didn't take him long to spring into action. I know in my heart that Teddy saved us. He is ultra protective, AND he can certainly turn if off fast!

Our family sleeps well, knowing Teddy will be watching over us, even if he does share the bed with a couple of kitties. He also shares it with his toy-of-the-day, and his human "mom and dad"...quite the bedful.

It was just over one year after this event that Teddy's instinctive protective actions came into play again. My best friend and her aged, sweet Corgi-doggy came to our beach house and we went for a nature walk in a public garden. Too much nature for this nature walk. I gave Teddy some extra leash length and he sprung up in a high leap, barking madly. I let him bark and bark and sound totally threatening. Teddy has a huge bark and enjoyed the reaction from us. The exposer rapidly un-exposed himself and these two grandmas reeled in the dogs and got out of there. Back out on the road, Teddy sat down and waited for a treat then happily completed his walk back home. Just another busy day for my great protector.



Starting Your Poodle in Weight Pulling By Elizabeth Glew

There are two aspects to weight pulling: mental and physical, with mental being the most important. Naturally, poodles outshine most other breeds at the mental game and, while a poodle will never rival a top-form pit bull or bulldog in the physical arena, with some basic conditioning, poodles can do very well.

Before you can start either the mental or the physical training, your poodle will need a custom-fitted harness. Harnesses by Carol (http://www.harnessesbycarol.com) has done an excellent job fitting my dogs. Her prices are reasonable and her delivery times are very good. Don't waste money on anything that's not custom-made for your dog. An off-the-rack harness will be sized for a pit bull or a staffy-bull and will not provide the best fit for your poodle. A perfect fit is crucial, as anything less will reduce your poodle's enjoyment and performance. Be sure to order the extra foam padding at the neck. Poodles need it.

Once your harness arrives, start training the mental game. Resist the temptation to pop the harness on and hook your dog up to a cement block! Instead, lay a strong foundation by introducing your poodle to the harness slowly, and be sure to make it a positive experience. You might try putting the harness on for meals at first,

then progress to short walks on grass while wearing it. Once your dog is happy about wearing the harness, you can start teaching the concept of pulling.



She's just getting ready to pull and you can see I've hooked her up to the cart (which weighs 420 lb) The man behind the cart is the braker, who stops the cart when she gets to the end of the chute. The yellow sandbags are what we use for weight. They are 30 lb each.

To introduce the pulling concept, attach a lightweight object, such as an empty ½ gallon milk jug, to the harness and call your poodle to come towards you a few feet. Give lots of rewards for bringing that jug to you! Once you're successful pulling a few feet, you can also take leash walks with your poodle dragging the jug. This stage of training is to help the dog understand that pulling something along behind is a good thing and not scary. Be liberal with the treats during this phase to help establish positive feelings about pulling.



She's just getting started, hasn't really started to pull yet, but you can see her tail is wagging. The faster the cart goes, the faster her tail goes.

By this point, your poodle should be getting excited when you get the harness out. Only after laying this groundwork should you ask your poodle to pull any weight. Start by filling that milk jug with water and call your dog to bring it a few feet to you. Again, reward success generously! Work up to having your poodle pull the jug about 20 feet.

You can back up in front of your dog, providing encouragement and treats along the way. Hold your treats low to the ground in front of your dog

to encourage good, headdown form.



She's showing pretty good form, head down, digging in, leaning into the harness.

When your poodle is consistent about pulling the filled milk jug towards you with some enthusiasm, you can start the physical conditioning, commonly called "drag work." Most people use an old tire for this – proportional to the size of the dog of course. Lucy pulls a little tire from a lawn tractor. Gradually work up to a mile a day pulling the tire – always on grass, dirt, or gravel. Never do your drag work on pavement! It's too abrasive and will injure your dog's feet. As always, use rewards liberally to make this a very positive experience. Your poodle should love putting that harness on and pulling!



She's doing the move that impresses all the "big dog" people, really hauling and rotating one shoulder for extra leverage. Typically you see pit bulls and bulldogs doing this, so she's a real crowd pleaser. They don't expect this level of effort from a poodle.

The last step is to combine the mental and physical into the complete pulling poodle. Get a sled of some type (not a wagon because it can roll into the dog's rear) and start having your dog pull some weights towards you about 20 feet. Start out with light weights and go slowly. The key is for your poodle to develop the belief, "If I'm hooked to it, I can move it!" It is important to build up your dog's confidence. Dogs who believe they can do it are the ones who win. Provide lots of encouragement, end every training session with success, and be sure to continue to reward generously.

These basics will get you started. Once you've completed these steps, it's time to find a weight pull club, or at least some training buddies, so you can get your dog accustomed to competition style equipment. Be sure to read the rules, which are available on the UKC web site before, you enter your first pull. Give this fun sport a try. Everyone loves to see a poodle in the chute!



Agility Dog Dictionary

A-frame: a long, slinky-like pipe that is fun to run through.



A-frame

Chute: what your human says when you take the "long slinky-like pipe that is fun to run through" once too often.

COME! go immediately to your human as soon as you're finished with the next three obstacles. **Contact:** what your human says to get you to start your engine and take to the skies.

Damnit: a dog title similar to Dr. for humans or MACH for some dogs: e.g., Dr. Smith, MACH Fifi, and Damnit Rex.

Quiet!: means you should cheer on the dog running the course. In the spirit of good sportsmanship, cheer louder for those dogs you don't particularly like, but cheer loudest of all for the dogs that live with you.

STAY!: an agility command that means wait until your human turns her back on you, and then quickly take the first few obstacles while she tries to catch up.

Table: one of the few shady spots on the course.

Teeter: a long slinky-like pipe that is fun to run through.

Touch: what your human says to get you to jump over the yellow zone on contact obstacles.

Triple: a long, slinky-like pipe that is fun to run through.



Triple

Tunnel: a long, slinky-like pipe that you run through anytime you don't know which obstacle your human wants you to take. Can also be taken because you prefer it to the obstacle your human wants you to take.



Adipose Derived Stem Cell Therapy in the Treatment of Canine Degenerative Joint Disease Secondary to Conformational Abnormalities Christine M. Meredith, VMD1

Chronic degenerative joint disease raises many challenges to the practitioner

Long term NSAID administration can induce unwanted secondary side effects

Autologous adipose derived stem cell therapy offers an effective option in treating canine DJD without requiring daily treatment.

A 4 year 9 month old 6.8kg (15 lb) intact male Rat Terrier named "Harley Blue" presented with a history of chronic lameness in both hind legs, a 6 month duration of refusal to go up steps, stiffness after rising from a laying position, and difficulty stretching. The dog also preferred lying to sitting. The lameness had persisted since 6 months of age. Previous diagnostic testing by the referring veterinarian included radiographs. Interpretation of those films revealed conformational abnormalities in both femurs and tibia. Management of this problem had included exercise restriction and NSAID therapy utilizing 25mg Rimadyl® (carprofen) once daily orally. The owner presented "Harley" because of gastrointestinal upset that had recently developed after administration of the NSAID. Pain was elicited upon flexion and extension of both hips and stifles which manifested as vocalization and an attempt at biting the examiner. "Harley" was radiographed under sedation with intravenous Propoflo (Propofol) and bilateral hip dysplasia, conformational abnormalities of the femurs and tibia, and stifle degenerative joint disease was evident. Rimadyl ® (carprofen) was discontinued and the owner was advised to temporarily feed a modified diet.

One week later, the patient re-presented to have an adipose tissue collection performed for intraarticular stem cell therapy. A pre-anesthetic panel revealed: ALT= 62 (10-100); ALKP 94 (23-212); TP 8(5.2-8.2); GLUC= 128 (77-125); BUN= 16(7-27); CREA= 1.1 (.50-1.8); PCV=42%.

A 2O gauge I inch catheter was placed in the right cephalic vein and induction with 90mg (.9cc) ketamine/ 4.6mg (.9cc) diazepam intravenously was followed by direct intubation and maintenance with isoflourane and oxygen. The patient was placed in dorsal recumbency and the surgical site was clipped, prepped and draped in standard fashion. The patient was monitored by pulse oximetry, continuous ECG and blood pressure. A 5cm linear incision was made over the right inguinal fat pad. The subcutaneous tissues were separated using blunt dissection and 15 grams of adipose tissue was obtained. The tissue was directly placed into the collection vile and shipped overnight to the Vet-StemTM laboratory in Poway, California.

The subcutaneous tissues were closed using 3-0 synthetic monofilament absorbable suture in a simple interrupted, bury the knot pattern minimizing dead space. The skin was closed with a subcuticular pattern and externally with stainless steel staples. The patient was administered 1mg (.3cc) Buprenex (buprenorphine) IV post-operatively. The recovery period was uneventful and the patient was discharged that afternoon. Vet-StemTM processing of the adipose sample yielded 81.3% viable cells with 420,000 cells per gram of tissue for a total viable cell yield of 5.6 million cells. The stem cells were returned via overnight courier within 48 hours of the original collection.

The patient was again induced with ketamine and diazepam via intravenous catheterization, intubated and maintained on isflourane and oxygen. The dorsolateral area over the left coxofemoral joint and the cranial aspect of the left stifle was clipped and prepped in standard fashion. The previously mentioned patient monitoring parameters were again utilized. Using sterile technique each syringe was rolled similar to resuspending insulin until a uniform consistency was attained. Using a 1 ½ inch 22 gauge needle, 1 cc of the cellular suspension (1.5 million cells) was injected into each joint in step-wise fashion so that sterile technique was not breached. The injection sites were covered with sterile 3x3 gauze and a trimmed piece of Elasticon. These bandages were allowed to remain on the patient throughout the remainder of the day. The process was repeated in the right coxo-femoral joint and stifle. During recovery, 1mg (.3cc) Buprenex (buprenorphine) was administered intravenously. The patient was again discharged that afternoon.

A 2 week post-procedure recheck was performed during which time the stainless steel staples were removed and the inguinal incision was assessed. The patient had not had any NSAID therapy in 22 days. The owner reported 6 days after the procedure the patient was more active, showed interest in playing, and attempted to go up the stairs. By 13 days post-procedure, the patient was running in their yard, playing with his ball, going up the stairs and sitting up on his hind legs to beg for a treat. The owner even commented that their neighbor had noticed the dramatic improvement in the dog's attitude and activity level. To date, "Harley" has not had to take any NSAIDS and his owners are more than pleased with the results.

Intra-articular use of adipose derived stem cells has been documented to induce long-term pronounced clinical improvement in equine patients, improving lameness scores, minimizing or eliminating the need for palliative medical management, and increasing the rate of return to function. To date, this is the first documented clinical application of autologous adipose derived stem cell therapy in canine degenerative joint disease. Additional patient evaluation will be

performed over the next months to quantify duration of pain relief and the presence, if any, of radiographically evident changes in the affected joints. Vet-StemTM technology, utilizing the benefits of autologous adipose-derived stem cell therapy, can be an effective method in managing otherwise difficult cases of canine osteoarthritis and degenerative joint disease.


me throw every step and helped at every turn. Arwen won her class! Then with our kind judge still guiding me Arwen proceeded to win Best of Breed!
