Just for fun, this month I will write a bit about the R.E.A.D. program that I have just been certified for with my standard poodle, Jackson (commonly called Jack). R.E.A.D. stands for Reading Education Assistance Dogs and is a program of Intermountain Therapy Animals, of Salt Lake City, Utah. The mission of the R.E.A.D. program is to improve the literacy skills of children through the assistance of registered Pet Partner® therapy teams as literacy mentors.

Jack and I are already a Delta Society Pet Partners team, and have worked in various visiting situations for the past 3 years. Since I moved to upstate New York, I have been looking for a facility for us. My first love is working with children, so I considered approaching a public school. Then I found a recently opened residential children's center not far from my home. Since I especially love kids with "problems", this seems right for me!

Jack and I will soon be finding what age group we will be working with, and then setting out to find materials that the kids (one at a time) can read to Jack. The idea is that there is far less pressure in reading to a dog than there is reading in front of people. I will work with the teachers at the facility to find the right books for each student. Jack and I will sit with the student on the floor and Jack will "listen" to the reading. I am now teaching him the "look" command, clicking and treating when he glances at the page. I will have to figure out how to reinforce that without too many treats during a real session!

I am very excited about this program because it is real Animal Assisted Therapy, with goals, documentation of progress, etc. As a retired social worker and educator, this is right up my alley! I hope Jack thinks so, too! I know he would much rather be in the field hunting up ducks, but --- hey --- we all have to work, don't we?

I am looking forward to meeting all of you at the Annual Meeting!

Her first agility dog was a lovely Poodle named Michelle that I raised. One of her current agility dogs is "Ester," one of the most darling Poodles ever, also raised by us at Tiara.

We had one heck of a gathering of owners (10), many of their friends and family along with their Tiara Standard Poodles (14) at the recent S. Cal UKC conformation show, South Bay Dog Fanciers on August 13, 2005. Perfect weather in a tree-shaded park on a lake was the setting. Six pop-up canopies, six grooming tables and no hairspray in sight; our set-up was delightful. As a Breeder, I was bursting with pride in my dogs and their owners this entire day and I thank them all for their dedication.

The morning began with Jane Mathis, of Irvine, showing her lovely puppy, Tiara Reiki, (for the first time ever in the ring for both) all the way to BEST in the nonlicensed puppy class under the very knowledgeable judge, Fred Lanting. That was a first for our clan and of course being the first time that Jane ever showed a dog (and not a horse) it was just wonderful. We have won many Best in Multi-Breed Show and RBMB awards among our clan, but never made it to the top with a puppy in the non-licensed show.

FOCUS ON PERFORMANCE Get ready for Rally!!

Rally Obedience

This is probably a strange topic for the UPBA newsletter since UKC hasn't gotten Rally up and running at this time. The Message Boards on the UKC web have the following:

UKC has placed Rally on hold for now. We apologize to our exhibitors, clubs and judges who are anxious for the initiation of this program. As soon as we are ready with this program, it will be announced in BLOODLINES and also on the UKC web site.

Those of us who have been participating in Rally look forward to UKC's program for rally. In the meantime, UPBA will be sponsoring a Rally Show N Go at the Nationals in November. (See flyer at the end of this newsletter.) This will be following the rules for APDT Rally (Association of Pet Dog Trainers) since UKC doesn't have rally yet. Since this is a "show n go" you don't have to be registered with APDT to participate. Novice Rally is done on lead. In AKC, the courses are more advanced than the CGC title, but less than the CD title. You do 15 exercises for novice, some of which may be repeated. The program is designed to test the skill of the dog and handler in working as a team. The APDT website says that Rally Obedience is ...where an enthusiastic attitude and wagging tail are more important than precision. Dogs and handlers should both appear to be enjoying the competition and each other's company.

During Rally Obedience, you can encourage your dog verbally and even clap your hands in the novice arena. You may not actually touch your dog, but you can lure your dog into doing the required course. Before the class begins, you are given a "map" of the course, and are allowed time to walk the course (without your dog) so you are familiar with what you are going to be doing and the directions to go. At this time, I've found most of the judges to be really helpful. They can answer your questions at this time if you are unsure. At every rally event I've attended, there has also been a book available with all of the signs and directions for completing that sign if it is unfamiliar.

You begin the course when the judge tells you to begin (she will ask if you are "Ready"). You follow the numbered signs and perform the skills in order. Attitude is more important than precision, and anyone who corrects their dog harshly will be severely penalized. For these reasons, both dogs and handlers seem to really enjoy doing the courses.

Likeable Recyclables Inexpensive crafts from Family Fun

Next time you're about to toss packing peanuts,



bottle caps, twist ties or rubber bands, think twice. These humble items can be the perfect materials for creating clever assemblages like the ones shown here. With

the following directions, you can replicate ours to a T, or better still, let them serve as a springboard for inventing a few characters of your own. Peanut The Poodle



To start, have your child draw a dog's head and body on a piece of corrugated cardboard. Then cut out the shape with scissors (your job). For legs, coat the tops of four Popsicle sticks with

glue and then push them up between the corrugated layers. Glue a thin strip of Bubble Wrap to the front of each leg. For the poodle's curly fur, glue Styrofoam packing shells or peanuts onto the cardboard. Snip a milk jug cap in half and glue it onto the head for a

floppy ear. Wrap a shiny twist tie (from a head of lettuce) around the neck for a collar and add a plastic trash-bag tie for a tail.

Cut and fold together a rectangular box, as shown in the diagram below, then glue or tape together the edges. (An even simpler option is to use the top half of an empty juice carton as a base.) Glue on corrugated siding (cut from a lightbulb box) and plastic bread-tag roof shingles.

I would also like to share with you a post from a friend of a local club member of ours in Northern MN; it really speaks to the relationship we all hope to have with our canine friends:

I don't know about y'all, but sometimes I feel a little more sappy than others. I had this little story sent to me tonight by another dog friend and it got to me. I thought I would share it because for as much as we all on this list "work" with our dogs, I thought this might help for those "rougher" times.

"Just last week I was reminded of a very important lesson... I teach motivational seminars. The last slide in my presentation talks about "the only lesson that really matters..." The content of that slide clipped and inserted below, is what, to me, is the most important aspect of dog training:

BEGIN SLIDE -- When I lead out on course, every single time, there is one last thing I say to myself before I turn around to release my dog. I pause, take a breath and think... "I love this dog with all my heart..."

You never, ever know when you won't have your beloved companion any longer. You never know if the run you're about to enjoy is the last one you'll ever have together.

You'd better enjoy every single moment while you can. If you do not, you will have missed the only lesson that really matters...the pure enjoyment that comes from the love and companionship of a trusted, loyal and loving canine partner. - END SLIDE

Last week I made a return visit to a group in Pennsylvania. I had worked with this group in April, teaching two days of motivation. One of the ladies who attended had a Springer Spaniel. She was frustrated with the dog, and the dog was stressed. We worked together during those two days, and at the end of the seminar, I thought to myself that she might actually turn the dog around. I felt there was hope for them as a team, mostly due to the lady's seeming desire to make positive changes and the dog's response in the short time I was there to work with them. When I returned to Pennsylvania last week, I presented one day's worth of motivation, and two days of handling. The lady I'd worked with in April participated in one of the handling sessions. The difference in her was amazing.

She'd found the recipe for her dog, and she was having fun out there, even in the face of mistakes. She'd learned all her lessons from April, and was putting them to work. It was a joy to watch. I returned home last Friday, exhausted, but feeling optimistic about some of the people I'd left behind to work on their issues, and in particular, the lady with the Springer Spaniel. On Monday I received a message from this lady that was titled, "sad news". I don't know about you, but I always struggle with messages that carry such a telling title; it can never be good.

The news in the message struck me very hard...the dog had passed away the night before from what, they didn't know. I sat at my computer and cried for her, for a long time. Some things just hit you harder than others, and this was a tough one for me. I, of course, sent her my deepest sympathy, which was heart-felt. She wrote back today, telling me what they had found out about the dog. She said,

"I remember what you said in your seminar back in April, about leading out and reminding yourself how much you love your dogs...I just knew you would understand what it means to love a dog." I had considered taking that slide out of my presentation...I've changed my mind.

I hope each and every one of you will remember, in your frustrations in dog training, what really matters. We just never know how much time we'll have with our beloved dogs...don't let the last run you have be a bad one." Leslie Renaud With this thought in mind, I get my obligatory photo of one of my dogs in each issue for no particular reason other than I "submit" it to myself! Hence, here is my 6 month old puppy, Quigley, the day before entering his first "show",

a little local 4-H open show. He was the youngest competitor, and this counted for the 4-Her's for the State Fair, so competition was keen! Anyway, they had ample trophy sponsors, so had to come up with extra



awards; one of them being Highest Obedience Score of Any Purebred Dog. We only entered 2 classes – Adult Showmanship and Beginning Obedience and came home with 3 trophies, including high score obedience against a field of 42 purebred dogs! I was so thrilled since my only objective was to have him behave well in a group of strange dogs. I was keen on the message of this post since I started training him; let it only be fun – I love this dog no matter what. I am looking forward to greater venues in the future, but there's nothing like relishing today!


