#### How to Evaluate a Poodle Breeder's Website

Many dog owners begin their search for a pet on the Internet. Completing a purchase over the Internet is ill advised; you have no way to verify information posted and little recourse if problems arise. However, the Internet might be a fun and informative way to begin searching for a new dog.

Many reputable breeders now have web sites, and a number of organizations including VIP (<a href="http://www.vipoodle.org/">http://www.vipoodle.org/</a>) provide valuable information to help in searching for your next dog.

How does one identify reputable breeders to contact and interview?

#### GOOD SIGNS

- Health testing to be cross-referenced with the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals (OFA) site (http://www.offa.org/). If not listed on the OFA website, breeder MUST be willing to show you documentation of ALL test results. Testing must be appropriate for age and variety. See http://www.vipoodle.org/docs/VIP\_education.html and click on VIP Recommended Health Tests.
- Titles (conformation, companion, or working) on dogs the breeder owns. This shows the breeder is currently active in the sport of purebred dogs, indicating that he or she is:
  - a. Proving their breeding stock.
  - b. Spending time and money on their dogs.
  - c. Actively in contact with the dog show world, where one can hear the scuttlebutt about problems in lines and obtain other valuable information.
- Membership in a dog club, preferably an AKC (American Kennel Club), UKC (United Kennel Club) or CKC (Canadian Kennel Club) club.

#### **RED FLAGS**

- 1. A breeder having numerous varieties or breeds.
- A breeder using any of the newest "marketing buzz phrases" like Hunting Poodles, Royal Poodles or Teacup Poodles.
- 3. Breeder advertises that puppies are always available.

- 4. Breeding young (too young for proper health clearances). Standards and Miniatures should be 2 years old, and Toys 1 year old, before breeding.
- 5. No health testing or only partial health testing.
- Breeder willing to sell and ship without personal contact.

If the breeder is still of interest to you after checking for "Good Signs" and "Red Flags," look for referrals, as many as possible. The breeder referral contact for a local PCA affiliate club is a good place to start; see http://www.vipoodle.org/docs/VIP\_Breeders.html.

A reputable/responsible breeder will refer to another breeder they trust. For additional information on finding a new Poodle dog, puppy or older rescue, see:

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## Attention Owners of Dogs Diagnosed with Melanoma

The Canine Hereditary Cancer Consortium needs your help! The CHCC is studying canine melanoma. They are requesting blood samples from any purebred dog with melanoma. The samples will be used in DNA studies to further research into identifying underlying genetic differences and biochemical pathways that contribute to this disease. The CHCC can provide sample collection kits, and will pay for shipping.

Requested samples include whole blood (5 mls in an EDTA – purple top – tube), and/or fresh tumor samples. Dogs in remission are eligible to participate in this study, as are dogs who have already had tumors removed.

## Should I Breed My Poodle?

So you want a litter of puppies? Most people with a female think about it at some point. Raising a litter sounds easy, but it is expensive and time-consuming to do responsibly.

#### COMMON MYTHS ABOUT BREEDING:

#### We want to make money.

Expenses add up quickly when you have a litter. First, your female should get a general health check up by your vet, including a test for brucellosis (an incurable, infectious disease of the reproductive tract that may cause abortion in females, infection of the sexual organs in males, and infertility in both sexes).

Before being bred, your female should be tested for the genetic problems in her variety (Toy, Miniature, or Standard). Examples of these problems include hip dysplasia, progressive retinal atrophy (which may cause blindness), luxating patellas, and thyroid problems. There are other conditions for which there is not a test, such as bloat and epilepsy. Are there dogs in your female's family that have developed any of these problems? DNA tests are available for some disorders and testing is not cheap, but you want to make sure your female is not herself affected or apt to pass a health problem on to her offspring.

Stud fees can range as high as the purchase price of one puppy. You will need to do research to locate a male that produces those desirable traits you wish to perpetuate or improve in your female. These traits include temperament and health as well as correct conformation. You may have shipping charges and boarding at the home of the stud you choose if he is not local. Who will pay for any necessary vet bills if needed while she is away?

Supplies add up, too. You'll need a whelping box, lots of newspaper and towels, and first aid equipment for the birth. You will need toys, crates and playpens for the puppies, and equipment such as play tunnels and short ramps for building confidence.

The bitch will need a vet check after whelping, as will the puppies, and Poodle puppies generally have tails docked and dewclaws removed. They will also need at least one set of puppy shots and perhaps worming before they are old enough to leave your home. If a Cesarean section is required, that means additional expenses including possible emergency clinic costs, and perhaps your help in feeding the newborn puppies until their mother has recovered from the surgery.

The cost of food adds up, too. Your bitch will need a very nutritious food, and she'll eat double her normal portion from the 5th week until she whelps and while nursing puppies. Once the puppies are weaned, you'll need to feed them, also. An average-sized litter of 4-8

puppies, depending on the variety of your Poodles, eats a lot. (Part of the reason you'll need a lot of newspaper!)

It is generally recommended (and a law in many states) that puppies stay with their mother until 8 weeks old. If you have not sold all the puppies by this age, you will have additional expenses housing and caring for them until they leave your home.

## We want to get back the purchase price of our dog.

There is no guarantee you will make a profit raising puppies. There are easier ways to make money which do not require as many hours of your time as the care and supervision of newborn puppies, nor the prior expenses that health clearances cost. You will have these expenses even if your female does not conceive, or if she fails any of the tests and you do not breed her at all.

#### It's the natural thing for dogs to have puppies.

Nature does not control the reproductive career of any domestic animal. In nature, only those animals that survive to sexual maturity reproduce, and many of their young do not survive. We do not adhere to 'survival of the fittest' when breeding our pets, but instead only breed for a reason. Reputable breeders try to better the breed by improving structural faults and breeding Poodles with good, stable temperaments who have demonstrated trainability by titling in performance venues.

#### Children should see the miracle of birth.

The miracle of birth isn't actually suitable viewing for many children; it's gory, painful for the bitch and seeing the birth may be traumatic for the child. There are books and videos made for children that show birth without the responsibility or expense of a litter of puppies. Instead, you are likely to find that the time required to clean up after and care for the puppies cuts into time you spend with your family. As the puppies grow, much time needs to be spent in keeping their box and play areas clean from urine, feces, and spilled food and water.

#### We want another just like her.

The puppies will be a combination of genes from their mother and father. Your Poodle is unique. It is unlikely any puppy will be an exact copy of one parent or another any more than a child is a duplicate of one parent.

#### We want a puppy for ourselves.

As you can see, it's much cheaper and easier to buy a new puppy than breed one for yourself. The breeder who sold you your Poodle can sell you another, most likely related to yours. This should help ensure your new Poodle has the same qualities you love in the one you already have.

#### We know lots of people who want a puppy.

People may say they want a puppy from your Poodle, but when the puppies are ready and available, it is likely most of them will not want one right now; the timing is wrong, circumstances prevent it, money is too tight. Even when people put down a deposit, they can back out. The excuses are endless.

Finding good homes can be difficult and you will need to be willing to spend lots of time interviewing and educating potential buyers and assessing which will be suitable homes and which will not. You will want to be sure each puppy will be well cared for, properly trained, and placed in a home that is compatible with his personality.

Are you willing to stand behind the puppies for their whole lives? Are you willing to take a puppy back at any age if the owner can no longer keep him? Can you help new owners find obedience classes, give advice on behavioral and medical issues, and answer grooming questions (common with new Poodle owners)? What will you do if the puppy develops health issues later in life? You created this life; will you stand behind him for his entire life?

#### She needs a litter... or... it will calm him down.

Not true. Hormones determine sexuality in animals. Animals do not miss what they never experience. Dogs settle down with maturity and training. Females do not need a litter; neutered males are less distracted by their environment and less likely to demonstrate undesired behaviors such as marking.

#### If you do decide to breed your Poodle:

Do your research in order to do a good job.

- Go to <a href="http://www.vipoodle.org/">http://www.vipoodle.org/</a> to find out what tests are needed for your variety and where to have those tests administered.
- Read the other educational materials at the vipoodle website at http://www.vipoodle.org/.
- Check the Poodle Club of America's web site at http://www.poodleclubofamerica.org/affiliate.htm to find a Poodle club in your area. Study the web site to learn more about the benefits of joining a local club.
- Join a local poodle club or local all breed club to meet and learn from other serious breeders.
- Subscribe to dog magazines such as Poodle

- Variety, Poodle Review and the AKC Gazette.
- The Poodle Club of America has a written and illustrated breed standard of perfection for Poodles. The breed standard describes and illustrates how the ideal Poodle should look, move and act. The standard is on AKC's website at http://www.akc.org/breeds/poodle/.
- Find a mentor, someone who already has years of experience breeding and who is willing to spend the time with you to answer questions and help you find the right dog to complement your female. This might be your Poodle's breeder, a member of a club, or an experienced breeder with a different breed of dog. Dog shows are a good place to get to know the people and breeders who show Poodles.

A good breeder continually compares her dogs against the breed standard to decide whether or not to breed. Good breeders show their dogs in the conformation ring so that their dogs' structure can be evaluated by others. Breed standards aren't easily understood in one reading. It takes study, and exposure to hundreds of dogs, before you can really see why certain characteristics are important and whether or not your dog has them to such a degree that breeding it would improve the overall quality of the entire breed. Other breeders exhibit in various performance events to prove the trainability of their Poodles and to demonstrate they still have correct breed temperament.

Many dogs end up in shelters because someone wanted to have a litter for fun without realizing the responsibility it entailed. Unfortunately, many of these dogs are euthanized each year. If you are not 100% committed to breeding the best Poodles you can, raising the litter to the best of your ability, finding the best homes for them, and staying in touch with your puppy buyers, puppies you breed may meet this fate.

If you breed a litter, you and the stud dog owner are responsible for each puppy for its entire life. If a puppy comes back to you, you are responsible for maintaining the puppy or finding another home for it. You will have to be continually vigilant that none of your pups end up in shelters or in bad homes.

You will need to learn how to write and enforce a contract for new owners to follow to assure your expectations for each puppy's care is met.

#### AKC registration requirements:

Maintaining accurate records is important when your pups are registered with AKC. If a question arose as to the breeding, parentage, etc., you will want to have the appropriate documents. As a breeder, you need to follow AKC's guidelines to the letter. AKC reserves the right to inspect your

records. If they do not meet their standards, they can refuse to register your puppies, impose a fine or even suspend you from all AKC privileges. ### He's Ruining My House!

Is your dog ruining your house? Does he chew things up? Does he "mess" in the house? All is not lost... he's acting like a completely normal dog. That is, a dog that hasn't been taught that people prefer he NOT do these things! As the human, it is up to you to manage him, manage the environment, and train him so that you can both lead happier - and safer - lives. Safer? You bet. The number one reason dogs are abandoned or taken to shelters (where they are almost certainly euthanized) is "behavior problems" that the owner allowed to develop. Hardly fair, is it?

So, what can you do so your dog has a better fate? First off, start with exercise. If your idea of a "good dog" is one that sleeps all day unless needed by you for brief entertainment, check into one of those new robot dogs! If you are willing to accept your pet's natural doggieness, then below is some advice that I hope helps.

#### Exercise

A tired dog is a "good" dog! Before leaving your dog for a prolonged absence in his crate or room, wear him out with some serious exercise. Long walks aren't good for a growing puppy's joints, but retrieving games, tug o' war, etc. are great and will provide super exercise. As soon as the dog is old enough (ask your vet), then you need to make walking your dog a part of your daily routine. Please be aware that this needs to happen EVERY DAY, SEVERAL TIMES A DAY, especially for hunting breeds! Most dogs need 60 minutes a day, although that can be broken in smaller walks (i.e. 30 mins in the morning, 30 mins in the evening). Longer excursions on weekends are great, but vigorous exercise must be provided every day. This is hugely important. Most dogs were bred for serious work which required stamina. Their needs for exercise are huge! Without serious aerobic exercise every day they vent that pent-up energy elsewhere... like your house. Lack of exercise also leads to boredom, which leads to mischief.

#### Management

Control your dog's access to things which he may damage - or may hurt him! When you can't pay

attention to him, keep him safe in a comfy crate or in a safe room behind a puppy gate. Put all shoes, pillows, etc out of his reach. Provide him with plenty of fun things to chew on. You can make a great chew toy by taking a Kong toy or a sterilized bone and filling the middle with something delicious. Treats jammed in there, to be worked out one at a time, or the entire insides smeared with peanut butter or cheese spread can keep a puppy entertained & happy for hours! You can also buy a product such as the Buster Cube where treats or kibble can be worked out throughout the day. This kind of chew toy is mentally stimulating as well. Also a good idea is to just leave a couple of toys out for your dog. Too many become b o r i n g. You can have many different kinds - just rotate which ones you have out each day!

#### **Interrupt Bad Behavior**

Catch your dog in the act of getting into the trash? Then shout "ACK!" at him. This will startle him and interrupt the behavior. Then tell him what he should do (such as go lie down) or can chew on (such as a pig ear).

#### Training

A dog with obedience training is just going to be more responsive to you in general. The training itself also serves as a form of exercise - mental stimulation will tire a dog out, too! Best bet is to enroll in group classes at a local obedience school, but if you can't find one which uses only positive reinforcement methods, try the lessons on this Web site. The Clicker Teachers site (clickerteachers.net) can help you locate a clicker trainer in your area.
