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

MEMBER ACTIVITIES & PERFORMANCE BRAGS

I guess this would be a "Performance" brag. :o) An update of what my Poodles and I are working on. (November 27, 2010)

SYDNEY AND THE NEWTON'S CRADLE

My Standard Poodles are veteran movie actors having starred in numerous movies that my husband and I produce. We recently finished videoing Act 1 (of a three-act story) of Jyah and Sydney's first mystery. At Jyah's detective agency on his office desk, there is a Newton's Cradle. I trained Sydney (who plays a Dr. Watson type to Jyah's mysterious "J. D." character) to use the device.

Newton's Cradle Multi-Ball Pendulum (named for Sir Isaac Newton (1643-1727) is a classic desktop executive toy that demonstrates Newton's principal: "For every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction." The device consists of a series of identically sized metal balls suspended in a metal frame so that they are just touching each other at rest. Each ball is attached to the frame by two wires of equal length angled away from each other. This restricts the pendulum's movements at the same place. If one ball is pulled away and is let fall, it strikes the next ball in the series and comes to a dead stop. The ball on the opposite side of the series acquires the momentum of the first ball almost instantly and swings in an arc that one would expect of the first ball. The intermediate balls appear stationary. What actually happens is that the first impact produces a shock wave that propagates through the intermediate balls. This continues until, toward the end of oscillation, even the intermediate balls jiggle a bit and they all come slowly to a stop.

In the scene, Sydney goes to the desk, picks up and pulls the first ball, and then lets it drop, starting the momentum. For her to understand how to correctly use this device, there were nuances she needed to be aware of: 1) pick up and pull only the outside ball - which isn't easy because each ball is the size of a marble and lies against its neighbor, 2) pull the ball back without displacing the cradle itself, and 3) let the ball go so that it hits the next ball with the correct amount of force. The degrees of distinction in accomplishing this are rather complex for a dog to understand.

So, how did I teach it?

Some things seem to take forever to train, and I thought this might be one of them . . . even though Sydney is very good with "front teeth" behaviors -- holding a pencil to type on a keyboard or to dial a phone, picking up quarters to put in a small-mouthed jar, etc.

The behavior turned out to be one of the easiest I have trained. Why? Since puppyhood, my Poodles have been taught to use learned behaviors in different contexts. I simply called Sydney over to the desk, showed her how the toy worked, and then held out the first ball asking her to "take it." When she did, I clicked (with a reinforcement clicker device) and she dropped the ball. (The click ends the behavior.) Next, I asked her to "get it" (the first ball) . . . which wasn't simple because her nose didn't fit easily into the cradle without getting tangled in the wires. It took only three tries for her to understand the concept of what was expected, and she could do it perfectly every time.

DON'T YOU DARE STEAL MY JOY by Linda Hargett Gower

One of my favorite articles that originally appeared in Front and Finish. I was asked to put it here - its worth reading if you put in any time at in competitive dog sports. Wording comments carefully goes a long way to preventing this - we're not perfect, its going to happen occasionally. Just the bearing in mind that everyone's goals are different can make the difference between a steal and a share.

On the occasion of my tenth anniversary, my husband asked me how I wanted to celebrate. I asked that we take a very dear friend, my adopted grandmother and one of the greatest of all the great southern ladies, out to dinner with us. At dinner, my husband, Brian, presented me with a diamond ring. It was gorgeous and I was speechless, but even as I thanked him, I worried about the expense and extravagance of such a gift. As if he knew that the next line belonged to my grandmother, my husband excused himself from the table. He was barely out of sight when she reached across the table and grabbed me by the shoulder, "I know what you're thinking, I know you think he couldn't afford it and it's too extravagant. I don't care if he had to put a second mortgage on the house to buy it, don't you steal his joy! It's beautiful. When FC AFC OTCH Law Abiding Ezra had both his field championships and 65 OTCH points including all the necessary first places, someone had the guts to come up to me, his owner, trainer and handler and say, "No dog will ever be a field champion and an obedience champion." My jaw drops when I think about it. Isn't it unfortunate that I remember this attempt at stealing my joy much more than I remember all the cards and letters and congratulations I received when those last 35 points were earned? If you are willing to destroy someone's dream, perhaps you don't realize that it is the JOY of pursuing the dream that keeps the dreamer motivated, not just reaching the accomplishment.

My husband and I travel and compete together. I remember an event, early in our relationship when I watched his Doberman fail articles. "Darn it," I said, as he came out of the ring," she didn't even try to find the right one!" "Oh", he replied, "but, weren't her heeling and signals wonderful?" Unknowingly, I had almost stolen his joy. He was celebrating the improvement on the exercise that had been giving him trouble, and I was focused on the failure. Since that experience, Brian and I have learned that the best response to a questionable performance, "What did you think?" That way, if the handler is excited about some aspect of the performance, you can share that excitement. If the handler is disappointed in another aspect, you can share the disappointment. You are safely removed from being a joy stealer.

I hope you have a lot of dreams and goals for your dogs in (the coming year). Undoubtedly there will be moments of disappointment as you venture through the landmines of injury, failures and other setbacks. Remember that the joy of the journey is worth the difficulties along the way and don't let anyone steal that joy. Guard it well and at the end of the road you can own it and revel in it with all the other memories of the trip.





PRACTICAL POODLE POSTSCRIPT.....

November Marks Annual National Pet Cancer Awareness Month

Cancer is not strictly a "human" condition. As the No. 1 disease-related killer of dogs and cats, cancer claims millions of pets each year. Pet Cancer Awareness month came into existence in 2005 after research noted that cancer diagnoses often caught pet owners by surprise. Many either did not know their pets could develop cancer or underestimated the cost to treat cancerous conditions.

The most common form of pet cancer, is lymphosarcoma. Other common forms of pet cancer include: mast cell tumors, fibrosarcomas (which stem from connective tissues), and hemangiopericytomas (a tumor generally located on a limb). Other types of neoplasias --defined as a growth or tumor--were commonly found on the liver, spleen or eyelid.

Following are the 10 most common types of cancer found in dogs and cats:

Top Pet Cancers

- 1. Lymphosarcoma

- 5. Osteogenic Sarcoma 10. Hemangiopericytoma
- 6. Neoplasia Liver
- Lymphosarcoma
 Neoplasia Liver
 Mast Cell Tumor
 Neoplasia Thorax
 Neoplasia Brain or Spinal Cord
 Neoplasia Eyelid
 Fibrosarcoma

To detect cancer early, pet owners should be attentive to any growing lump or sore that fails to heal, drastic changes in a pet's appetite or weight, unusually strong odors coming from a pet, discharge or bleeding from any body opening, difficulty chewing or swallowing, or an unwillingness to exercise. Although cancer can be challenging to treat, early detection can improve the prognosis.

Routine veterinary exams are an integral part of general health evaluation and early cancer detection. Your family veterinarian is the best one to recommend the frequency of examinations, but typically this is annually for patients under 7 years of age and may be twice yearly for patients over 7 years. Your veterinarian may also recommend laboratory diagnostics and imaging such as radiography (x-ray) or ultrasonography (sonogram) as regular health monitoring tools for mature veterinary patients.

Examine your pet thoroughly every month, including obtaining a body weight if possible; keep a record of exam notes and body weights for later reference and to identify health trends. If your pet will allow you to safely examine their mouth, this should be done as well. The mouth is a common site of malignant cancers that unfortunately often go undetected until they are very advanced. You know your pet best; take changes in your pet's health or examination status seriously.
